The Read Like a Writer Strategy A mentor text is any piece of writing, partial or complete, that can be used to teach a writer about some aspect of the craft of writing A mentor text can be a picture book, a line, a passage, a chapter from a novel, a feature

Reading to Write Some books are to be tasted, others to be chewed, and some few to be chewed and digested Reading critically means interacting with the text(s) with a particular purpose in mind looking for the “right” answer but, rather, generating Reading critically as a writer does not mean many ideas from which to choose

Studying Author’s Craft to Support Growing Writers Presented by: Angela Eastman Author’s craft is defined as any purposeful and meaningful technique an author uses to capture the reader’s attention (Ehmann and Gayer, pg 4) By explicitly teaching students to notice and discuss author’s craft when reading, authors become mentors for student
